SUPERINTENDENT'S CORNER



Greetings Tulpy Family!!

So...here we are! Fresh from the end of the 2019-2020 school year and words cannot describe the impact that this year will have on all of us. I am sure no one ever envisioned such a global event could put all of our lives in such upheaval. Moving online for instruc tion was challenging at both ends of the spectrum. I know for my own kids it was not easy. Many hours were spent arguing as to why we had to sit down at the kitchen table and work on math or reading.

Moving forward, there are a lot of things to consider and I know many of you have questions and concerns. There are many issues that we need to consider when re-opening schools. Some of the issues social distancing in the classrooms, hallways, and cafeterias

as well as transportation on busses. To compound the situation, every agency and expert has a different perspective on COVID-19. I hope you enjoy them as much as many of our staff had making them!



REAL ESTATE TAXES REDUCED AGAIN

For the fourth consecutive year the Tulpehocken School Board reduced the real estate tax rate. The approved rate for the 2020-2021 school year is 26.75 mills, a reduction of .1 mills from the previous rate of 26.85 mills. The graph below compares our tax rate to the Berks County school district average rate over the past ten years. Tulpehocken's rate is .7 mills or 2.5% lower than it was ten years ago while the average Berks County school district's rate increased by 4.2 mills or 16% for the same period. The recent construction of warehouses along the I78 corridor has increased the district's revenue substantially and the administration and school board have consistently managed expenses to provide an educational program that balances the interests of all stakeholders.



The COVID-19 pandemic has proven to be a challenge for our financial planning due to the uncertainty of the economic future locally, statewide, nationally, and globally. Our projected revenue reflects a decrease of over \$1 million for next year due to the projected economic downturn. Consequently, our projected expenditures reflect a similar reduction and plans for the renovation of the Junior Senior High School have been put on hold until the outlook becomes clearer. We are still moving forward with necessary repairs such as a roof replacement, sidewalk repairs, and HVAC upgrades at Penn Bernville Elementary School as well as preventative maintenance, safety, and security upgrades at all district buildings.

Because of the economic downturn, the school board approved a change to the real estate tax payment periods to assist taxpayers that may have financial hardship. The discount period will be extended by one month and the face (or flat) period will be extended to 12/31/2020. Tax payments received in July, August and September will receive a 2% discount and tax payments received in October, November and December will be at the face (or flat) amount. The district will not charge a penalty for payments received in November and December but any bills that are unpaid as of 12/31/20 will be turned over to the Berks County Tax Claim Bureau for collection as usual. This change is for the school real estate tax bills dated 7/1/2020 only! The Per Capita and interim real estate taxes will reflect the normal tax period schedule of a two-month discount period, a two month face period, and a two month penalty period.

Hopefully, this pandemic will end shortly and we can get back to business as usual quickly to continue working on the great things ahead for the Tulpehocken students, staff, and community.

PENN-BERNVILLE CANSTRUCTURE TEAM WINS 1ST PLACE AT COMPETITION

On Saturday, March 7^{th,} a team from Penn-Bernville Elementary participated in the 3rd annual VoiceUp Berks CanStructure Competition at the Berkshire Mall. Members of the team designed a structure built of cans that incorporated the theme "Inspire Kindness." Students held a Coin War week back in February at PB where all students in the school were challenged to bring in different coins each day. The goal of the coin war was to raise money to purchase the cans needed to complete the build. Penn-Bernville Elementary students donated over \$2,000 to the CanStructure team to purchase cans and boxed items. Third grade students at the school earned an ice cream party by donating the most coins.

The team used the money raised from coin wars to purchase over 3,000 cans and several boxed items to build their design. The final structure built during the competition was a giant bee, which the team named the Busy Bee. The bee sat in the grass where certain cans spelled out the word "Kind." The goal of the structure was to remind people who see it to "Bee Kind." Students on the team incorporate their pictures into the letter I in the word kind and they also wrote ways to inspire kindness on flower cut outs and used those to build giant flowers around the bee. The CanStructure team was led by Mrs. Sanders and Mrs. Jacobs. Team members were Balin Honicker, Daisy Deavers, Addyson Ludwig, Raymond Snyder, Caedence Thomas, Carter Boltz, Sean Jacobs, Samuel Joy, Samuel Lutz, Luke Blimline, and Cooper Schwalm (Bethel Student.) Penn-Bernville's CanStructure team presented to a panel of judges and was even featured on the Channel 69 news. The team was announced the winner of the elementary/intermediate division of the competition during the awards ceremony!

K'NEX COMPETITION

The Berks County Intermediate Unit and ThermoFisher Scientific sponsored the 2020 K'nex Challenge on Thursday, February 27, 2020. Tulpehocken sent four teams of 4th and 5th graders to compete against students from a long list of Berks County schools.

In all, 40 teams from fourth and fifth grades attended to show their hard work. Students were assigned the challenge of creating a way of conserving energy in the future. For example, transforming energy from one object to power another or creating a new type of energy to power a city.

Our teams worked for 3 months on their designs. They designed and built their projects which were required to use at least one motor and use no more than 1,400 K'nex pieces. Teams also kept a daily journal of their progress.

On the day of the competition, teams were given two hours to completely rebuild the product using their blueprint, which was required in the competition. Each team was able to present their finished product, blueprint, and journal to a panel of judges.

Our students showed great teamwork, problem solving skills, and innovative ideas in the competition.

UPDATES FROM THE NURSING DEPARTMENT

Immunization Reminders:

Students entering 7th grade in the 2020-2021 School Year will need a Tdap and Meningitis vaccine prior to the first day of school.

Students entering 12th grade in the 2020-2021 School Year will need a second Meningitis vaccine prior to the first day of school.

If your child has already obtained these immunizations, please send a record to the nurse in your child's building.

Medication Policy Reminder:

All medication administered during school hours will need a doctor's order and parent permission signature. Medication must be labeled from a pharmacy. This includes inhalers and EpiPens. Medication forms can be found on the district website. A new medication form is required each year.

Physicals and Dentals:

The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania requires all students in Kindergarten, 6th, and 11th grade to obtain a physical exam. Documentation can be accepted the year prior to the mandated grade. If you have not yet turned in your child's physical exam, please do so before the end of the school year.

The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania requires all students in grades Kindergarten, 3rd, and 7th grade to obtain a dental exam. Documentation can be accepted the year prior to the mandated grade. If you have not yet turned in your child's dental exam, please do so before the end of the school year.

ATTENTION SENIOR CITIZENS AND DISABLED INDIVIDUALS

The deadline to apply for a rebate on property taxes or rent paid in 2019 is June 30, 2020. The Property Tax/Rent Rebate program benefits eligible Pennsylvanians age 65 and older; widows and widowers age 50 and older; and people with disabilities age 18 and older. The program income limit is \$35,000 for homeowners and \$15,000 for renters (which excludes half of Social Security income) and the maximum rebate for both homeowners and renters is \$650. In addition, property tax rebates are increased by an additional 50 percent for senior households in most of the state, as long as those households have incomes under \$30,000 and pay more than 15 percent of income in property taxes.

In Berks County alone, 17,731 claimants received nearly \$9 million in rebates from this program in 2016. The average rebate was \$496. Don't miss out on this valuable program. Property Tax/Rent Rebate application forms and assistance are available at no cost from Department of Revenue district offices, local Area Agencies on Aging, senior centers and state legislators' offices.
