How to use Scholarship Searches

- Most scholarships are gift aid, which does not need to be repaid. However, some scholarships come with requirements that if not met, convert the award to a loan. Make sure you understand all terms and conditions before accepting any award.
- Scholarships may be awarded based on a variety of things, including academic merit, athletic ability, field of study, ethnic background, religious affiliation, and special interest.
- Many scholarship organizations require applicants to complete the FAFSA.

Scholarship Search Tips

- 1. Begin your search early and research as much as you can. Apply to many scholarships.
- 2. Watch deadline and make sure you meet them.
- 3. Follow directions. Provide everything that is requested but no more than is required.
- 4. List all activities and honors. Highlight those that are relevant to the scholarship.
- 5. Be neat. Type your application.
- 6. Photocopy the application before you begin. This will give you a "sloppy" copy that you can finalize later. Make a copy of your completed application as well.
- 7. Write an essay that makes a strong impression. Tell a story and use personal examples.
- 8. Choose references that know you well. Give them plenty of time to write the recommendation.9. Proofread. Ask someone else to proofread it as well.

BEWARE OF SCAMS

- Read the fine print and make sure you understand all terms and conditions before accepting any award.
- Be wary of companies that "guarantee" you will receive a scholarship.
- Never provide any confidential or personal indentification information to an unfamiliar person or organization. Credit card or bank account information should not be required.
- Remember that there are many free scholarship searches available where you can get all the information you need at no charge. You should not have to pay fees or "taxes".
